Thank you for your continued prayers. Enjoy the rest of your summer.



Salvatorians Celebrate the Priestly Ordination of Four Men

Diversity at the Universal Table

Four devoted men gathered together to share and celebrate their priestly ordination on Sunday, June 23rd at the Salvatorian-led parish of Mother of Good Counsel in Milwaukee, WI. The ordinations were celebrated by the Most Reverend Jeffrey Robert Haines, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. These men had spent the last year, their diaconate year, immersing themselves into all aspects of parish and community life, as a way to put into practice all the lessons learned during religious formation.

“The formation journey is a very involved process of discernment and spiritual awakening,” said Fr. Peter Schuessler SDS, vicar provincial and director of formation for the Society. “Each of these men immersed himself in the Salvatorian charism and is now prepared to take that next step of commitment to life as a Salvatorian priest.”

“These men come from very different backgrounds, but each one is truly Salvatorian,” said Fr. Jeff Wocken SDS, USA provincial. “Universality is one of our core values. We are a diverse community called to serve people from many different walks of life. This unity in diversity requires respect and forgiveness, which is a powerful witness of Communion in our Church and world.”

Fr. Patric Nikolas native of San Jose, California —



“My diaconal year gave me the opportunity to preach, participate more thoroughly in the Mass, and get accustomed to the view from the front of the church. I used to sit in the back like a good Catholic,” he said. “Priesthood is the permanent commitment I’ve been formed to take on, and I approached June 23 with profound gratitude and humility.”

Nikolas will be teaching theology and doing sacramental ministry full time at Divine Savior Holy Angels High School in the fall.

Fr. Octavio Trejo-Flores native of Zihuatanejo, Guerrero, Mexico —



“Preparation for the priesthood has taken years of arduous preparation both spiritually and academically. My Salvatorian formation has given me a solid foundation for my future ministry,” said Trejo-Flores. “Throughout my diaconal year, the love that the faithful have shown me has inspired me. I ask God to help me serve His People with the same love that God shows me every day.”

Trejo-Flores returned to the Salvatorian-sponsored, Camp St. Charles, in Newburg, MD, for a third summer. He is ministering by saying Mass and participating in leadership activities with the campers. In the fall he will head to our southern region to begin service as the associate pastor of a parish in Florida.


Fr. Virginius Osuagwu native of Nigeria —



“Formation played a critical role in preparing me for both my ordination and the mission ahead,” said Osuagwu. “I have come to understand the meaning of grace, that is, how Jesus walks into the lives of ordinary people like me and transforms them into usable instruments to promote the reign of God.”

Osuagwu continues to explore ministry possibilities on the east coast, where Salvatorians have a significant presence. After his ordination, his interest lies within a new social justice ministry that he hopes to develop.

Fr. Paul Wilkin native of Cincinnati, Ohio —





What's with all those layers?

The Act of Vesting

When celebrating Mass and the sacraments clergy don various vestments. At their ordinations our newly ordained priests wore these vestments for the first time. The current traditional clergy apparel worn includes the amice, alb, cincture, stole, and the chasuble. To follow is a quick snapshot of what it all means.

The **Amice**, which may or may not be worn, is traditionally the first piece of vesting placed around his neck. It is symbolic of a helmet, much in the way that Roman soldiers used a cloth to collect sweat under their helmets. A priest uses this vestment as a symbol to repel the devil and collect sin.

The **Alb**, worn over the amice, symbolizes the garment of the newly baptized, also the purity of soul required for Mass.

The **Cincture**, which may or may not be worn, is a cord used as a belt to gather the alb at the waist. It is most often white, but can be the color of the day or liturgical season. Often Salvatorians will wear the black cincture from their habit to celebrate Mass.

The **Stole** is the most important and primary sign to signify priesthood and is worn like a scarf over the neck and down the front. Its origin is in the Jewish prayer shawl and is symbolic of the spiritual authority of a priest. The stole is worn for everything—Mass, confessions, exorcisms. Often priests will carry one in their vehicles for an emergency anointing of the sick.

The **Chasuble** is the final vestment and comes in many shapes but must adhere to the proper liturgical color – such as purple for lent. While in the past the chasuble has represented priestly authority, today it is more commonly understood as a symbol of charity.
